## Listen to the broadcast

Dr. James Dobson: You're listening to Family Talk, the radio broadcasting division of the James

Dobson Family Institute. I am that James Dobson and I'm so pleased that you've

joined us today.

Roger Marsh: Well welcome to Family Talk, the broadcast division of the Dr. James Dobson

Family Institute. I'm Roger Marsh. And in just a moment we're going to hear part one of a classic conversation Dr. Dobson had with Cathe Laurie. Cathe is the wife of pastor and evangelist Greg Laurie and she's written a book called *As I See It*, and she and Doctor had a fascinating conversation about that resource. Before we begin though, a reminder that we're less than two weeks away from Election Day 2024 and here at the Dr. James Dobson Family Institute, we have a whole host of resources that you'll find helpful as you're preparing to cast your vote. Dr. James Dobson: Today we're going to talk to a wonderful lady, talking about Cathe Laurie who

has devoted her life to her own family and also to Christian women. She has been married to Pastor Greg Laurie for 45 years. 40 years ago they founded the Harvest Fellowship Church in Riverside, California and they reached tens of thousands of people every week. It's really incredible what their outreach is. They're heard and seen every week in California on six campuses by satellite and then around the country. I know they're on the Trinity Christian broadcast, TBN. Cathe has authored two books, one entitled *Happily Ever After*. You can guess what that's about. And a newer book called *As I See It*. We're going to talk about that today. But I've been reading this book and although it's primarily for women, it really presents many aspects of Christian family life and I think men will enjoy it too. Cathe helped found the Harvest Women's Ministry and she

served as its director for more than four decades, and she and Greg have two

children, one of them is in Heaven and five grandchildren. Cathe, how do you get it all done?

Cathe Laurie: I think of it as jumping hurdles. You're running a race and you just face the

hurdle in front of you and you pray for grace and you somehow find the strength the Lord supplies what you need when you need it, doesn't he?

Dr. James Dobson: He does. You still enjoy being a wife and mother and grandmother?

Cathe Laurie: Oh, it's the joy of my 45 years being Greg's wife, being mom to Christopher and

Jonathan and now the grandmother of the five little ones we have, and we're very close to them. We see them every week as much as we can. It's Greg's hobby, he says, he doesn't really have a hobby, he just has his grandkids.

Dr. James Dobson: Well, he's got a lot more on his plate than that. It's incredible. You have an

event called a Crusade, the Harvest Crusade.

Cathe Laurie: We do the SoCal Harvest Crusade every year in August at Anaheim Stadium.

Dr. James Dobson: And that's where the Angels play.

Cathe Laurie: That's right. Yes.

Dr. James Dobson: Is that right?

Cathe Laurie: Hmm-hmm. And we're actually celebrating our 30th anniversary of doing this in

Anaheim at that crusade, stadium. It's amazing.

Dr. James Dobson: Well, what I remember too is that a couple of years ago you held one of those

crusades at the AT&T Stadium in Dallas, which is where the Cowboys play and there are 80,000 seats in there and they couldn't get in. Every seat was taken and there were I think 15, 20,000 people outside. Does this shock you looking back, and here you have in some cases a hundred thousand people who want to

hear what Greg has to say? The Lord's got His hands on you all.

Cathe Laurie: We have seen God's faithfulness for those 45 years and the man I married 45

years ago was sort of an embryonic version of the guy he is today, but his commitment to the Word of God and to his family has never wavered. It has held him fast and we're excited to see what the Lord's going to be doing in our future as well. Greg's just going strong and it's just a blessing. There's that story

of the turtle on a fence post. You've heard that.

Dr. James Dobson: Yeah. How did he get there?

Cathe Laurie: You see a turtle on a fence post. There's only one way and that is someone put

him there. And I've watched God do that in Greg's life. Every year God's

faithfulness, it has surprised us both. We're so thankful for what he's done and

we're looking forward to what he's going to be doing in the future.

Dr. James Dobson: Well, I've watched him too and I'm very proud of him. I love this man.

Cathe Laurie: Thank you.

Dr. James Dobson: You love him too, don't you?

Cathe Laurie:

I sure do. I sure do. More and more. Love has changed over the years. It's grown deeper. I'm not the 16-year-old and he is not the 19-year-old we were when we first met, but we both have the same love for the Lord and our love has grown deeper. It's wonderful.

Dr. James Dobson:

Shirley and I have been married for 58 years, so we got you by a few and it does get better. It's amazing. I'm just loving this time in my life with her. There's nothing I'd rather be doing than being at home on a weekend with nobody there, just the two of us. She's working on her stuff. I'm working on mine, but just cooking together and being together. How could that be after 58 years that we still enjoy each other's company?

Cathe Laurie:

Marriage can be like a garden and when you first get married, you're actually planting the seeds that you're going to reap the fruit of in years to come. So as beautiful and as lovely as it is to plant a garden that first year, second year, but those fruit trees that you plant, those seeds that you plant in years to come, you're going to be reaping the results and the fruit of that and we feel like we're just now beginning to see the meaning of marriage. That's how deep and rich it is. 45 years and we can look back to what love was when we first met each other and when we were first married, but every stage has grown deeper and richer and I think that's God's plan for us.

Dr. James Dobson:

Yeah, I love people. I enjoy being around them, but I'm telling you, after 58 years I still find Shirley interesting. I still enjoy talking to her. Isn't that amazing that what God does there?

Cathe Laurie:

Yes. I think that when you commit yourself in marriage that God is able to bring new things all the time, new ways in which to show and express your love to one another, and marriage is not about finding oneself, it's about losing oneself, sowing into the life of another person, what it means to love sacrificially. And if we look at the creator of the universe and the complete satisfaction and joy within the Trinity, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, and Jesus demonstrated what God's love is like and it's a love that sacrifices. It's a love that goes the distance. It's a love that grows deeper and a love that has purpose. And in our marriages, hopefully we are a reflection of that love.

Dr. James Dobson:

I want to do something I don't often do. I'm not a great reader, but I am going to read something that you wrote. It's in your book, *As I See It*, and this is the dedication. Usually authors write dedications that are three or four lines long and they're pithy or what have you, but yours is a little longer and this is what you wrote to Greg on your anniversary. I think this is really special. "This year marks the 39th year that I've been your friend, wife, lover, co-laborer in ministry, walking partner, etc, etc. 39. Who knew the funny, joyful, exciting and at times terrifying ride that life would take us on when I said I'd marry you? But then our idea of an exotic honeymoon to which we both agreed was Disneyland's Enchanted Tiki Room and the ride on the Matterhorn." That's what you called a honeymoon. Is that right?

Cathe Laurie: You have to remember I was 17 when we were engaged, so my expectations

weren't all that high.

Roger Marsh: Well, we've reached the midpoint of today's conversation here on Dr. James

And now let's continue with the conclusion of today's edition of Dr. James Dobson's Family Talk with Dr. Dobson's conversation with author and pastor's wife, Cathe Laurie.

Dr. James Dobson: Cathe, you were just teenagers and yet you were making this lifetime

commitment, but it does look like all those expectations have been fulfilled. Let me continue quoting you as you wrote to Greg. "I don't recall that you ever formally proposed. I just remember two pivotal conversations. One was driving home from Idlewild camp in your broken down Corvair." I also had a broken down car so I know what that was like. Continuing. "I must have been 15 and you 18, and you said something like, 'Well, I guess we're boyfriend and girlfriend now, but there's one thing I want you to know. If you ever get between me and

my relationship with the Lord, it will be over, okay?""

Cathe Laurie: Dr. Dobson, I loved it. I loved the fact that he loved Jesus more than he loved

me, gave me a great sense of security. I thought, this is the man that I can

follow.

Dr. James Dobson: What is really neat is for those of us who know his background, he grew up in a

very, very troubled family. He had no idea who Jesus Christ was and the Lord got a hold of him. He was a druggie. He really had a difficult childhood and early

adolescence itself, but boy, when he fell for the Lord, he fell 100%.

Cathe Laurie: Exactly, and that's where he learned his standard and model for marriage was

from the Scriptures, not from his mother who had been married seven times.

Dr. James Dobson: Well, you said here you were ever the romantic. Believe it or not, I was so happy

to hear you say what I just read. I was sick of guys who were wishy-washy. Did

you run into some of those kind of guys?

Cathe Laurie: Hmm-hmm.

Dr. James Dobson:

"Then of course there was your official marriage proposal after breaking up and getting back together three times, it went something like this. 'So I guess we ought to make plans to tell your mom and dad that we want to get married. All right?' Oh sure. They were thrilled about that. They always wanted me to marry a guy without a steady paycheck and looked like Red Beard the pirate." Anyway, is that the way he looked?

Cathe Laurie:

Yes, he did. He had shoulder length hair and a red beard that was long. I thought it was great. I mean, you have to remember the times in which we were growing up. Those hippies were pretty cool, I thought.

Dr. James Dobson:

Continuing. "I love you for a hundred reasons and more. I never wondered if you loved me. You make me laugh, and when you couldn't, you still kept trying. You're generous. I've often thought when balancing the checkbook that you were too generous. I have never doubted that you were faithful. I always knew you would put God first above the kids and me. You are kind and forgiving even when you've been hurt. You are never petty or vindictive. Okay. Okay. Enough praise for one day. I think you get the rest of it. I love you with all my heart more today than ever. You said it best in a card that you gave me 40 years ago. Remember the dark ages when we used to write things on paper? Nothing is better for me than that." Cathe, that's wonderful.

Cathe Laurie: Thank you.

Dr. James Dobson: That is beautiful. I know why you put it as a beginning of your book.

Cathe Laurie: He's my greatest encourager and he is the stable force apart from the Lord in my life. This book wouldn't be in print if it weren't for Greg encouraging me and telling me I could do this and almost forcing me to do this. This would not be

here if it weren't for him.

Dr. James Dobson: All right. I won't turn the corner. You have led this, it's not a Bible study, but it's

a women's fellowship, right?

Cathe Laurie: It's even more than a... It is a Bible study, but there are so many facets and we

call it the Virtue Women's Ministry, which incorporates a weekly Bible study, very similar to Bible study fellowship or community Bible study. We go through books of the Bible. There's a homework aspect to it, there's a small group discussion aspect to it, there's a teaching aspect to it. That's one facet. And then we have the Virtue website, which has everything on there that I think women

would be interested in. Everything from homemaking and crafting to blogs that I write to inspiring recipes, hopefully that women will find the home a place to

invest their lives.

Dr. James Dobson: How many women come to these events?

Cathe Laurie: On a weekly basis, in September when we start up, we have almost 2,000

women, and this is in the Bible study. And then we have special events throughout the year where we bring in authors and speakers and we love reaching into the lives of women. We understand how important it is.

Dr. James Dobson: All right. You have dealt with a lot of women over the years, you know women.

What can you tell us about women, especially in California where the pace is so rapid and that everybody is racing and running and huffing and puffing, what are their fears? What are their aspirations? What do they feel about marriage? Give us a little overview of what you're learning. I know every one of them is

different, but there are some trends. What can you tell us?

Cathe Laurie: Well, I think women in California are similar to women all over the country in

the sense that they're forced to compare themselves with a standard that is impossible to meet. With social media and things like Instagram and Facebook, we are constantly forced to compare ourselves to a standard that's impossible

to achieve.

Dr. James Dobson: You're referring to beauty?

Cathe Laurie: Beauty, accomplishments. They need to be super everything. You have to be

successful at work, you have to be athletically fit, you have to be beautiful, you have to be a mother and a wife, and you have meaningful relationships, all the wild juggling, all of these things to perfection. And we know that's not the reality of what we are. And there's a great deal of frustration and insecurity and the snare of living in the light of comparing ourselves to others. So what we try to do is pour into women's lives that the most important thing they can do is what the Scriptures tell us. And that is that wisdom comes from seeking God. That wisdom that we need to live our lives, be who it is that God has called us to be. We find in the pages of His book. So the centerpiece of my ministry is to put women in touch with the God who loves them. And if we find our security and our identity and our worth in Him, we're going to be able to be what He's called

us to be.

Dr. James Dobson: Cathe, you said on page 177 that young women, wives and mothers need help

and decisions about everything. And you have written, "Every girl knows the feeling. We want to feel loved. We want to know that we matter. Despite all that we may have accomplished, there are lingering questions. Who am I? Why am I here? Where do I go for answers?" Do you remember writing about that?

Cathe Laurie: Absolutely. If you read Instagram or you even read popular Christian books

today, Dr. Dobson, we're being told over and over again, you are significant, you are loved. God is there. He loves you no matter what you've done, and it doesn't seem to be having its effect in our lives. And I think the reason for that is we've

got our eyes on ourselves.

We're still looking to ourselves. We've got to get our eyes off of ourselves, look up to the heavens, look up to Jesus in the face of Jesus and understand God sent his son to die on a cross for us as individuals. He loves us that much. Now we as women, how can we find that kind of security if we aren't looking to the One who holds us secure? Because this is not a safe world we live in. We live a fallen world and there's so many things that can come at us that can destroy that image, but God holds our identity securely in His hands and He holds us as well. And no matter what comes our way, we can find the foundation and security for our lives in that.

Dr. James Dobson:

Cathe, when I wrote the book *Life on the Edge*, which was written for those between 16 and 26, we wanted to find out a little bit more about that age group. And so we did focus groups and brought young people in. They weren't all Christians and we asked them a lot of questions about their lives. And do you know that the number one answer that these young people gave to us, and again, this was not from a Christian community especially, the question they want answers to is, does life have meaning? That's the challenge of this generation. Why do I have meaning? Who cares? What is life all about? And you can only find the answers to those questions, especially those relating to the afterlife. Is God going to hold me accountable? Is He real? Is He there? Does He care? Does He know me? All of those questions can only be answered in a relationship with Jesus Christ.

Cathe Laurie:

And the world is more confused than ever about who they are. You're going to see a constant change and shifting as culture and different winds blow through in trends. God's so wonderfully gracious in allowing us in this generation to have at our fingertips, at the click of a mouse or the keyboard access to the Bible. Never have the Scriptures been more available to us. If God is not in this generation matching the lies out there with the proliferation of His truth, it's so easy to access if we would just look in the right places for it.

Roger Marsh:
