EL PAÍS HISTORICAL ARCHIVE

El País emerged in 1976 as the first newspaper dedicated to promoting social liberalism and democratic ideals in post-Franco Spain. As the national newspaper of record for the country, it represents a rich archive of nearly five decades of Spanish-language news. Using the full run of *El País* through 2023, researchers can dive deeply into a distinctly Madrid-based perspective on historical events, politics, economy, sports, culture, society, technology, people, opinion, travel, fashion, and more. 

PART VI: IRELAND, 1783-1950

Key topics include nationalism and Irish independence, Fenianism, the Roman Catholic Church, the Irish diaspora, the establishment of the Land League, the Irish literary revival, as well as sport and leisure.


I Seventeenth and Eighteenth Century BURNLEY NEWSPAPERS COLLECTION, PART I

The *Seventeenth and Eighteenth Century Burney Newspapers Collection* represents the largest single collection of seventeenth- and eighteenth-century English news media available from the British Library, containing more than 1,000 pamphlets, proclamations, newsbooks, and newspapers from the period. Part II consists entirely of new full-colour scans of the original volumes in the British Library. Many of these documents are fragile and highly prized by those studying this historical period. Items in this new collection include:

- 'Missing' Burney: items from within the Burney collection which were not included in the original microfilm from which the digital collection was created, comprising more than 9,000 pages. With *Part II*, these lost pages are now available to explore.
- 'Additional Burney': items outside of the original 'core' Burney collection, more seventeenth- and eighteenth-century newspaper titles and issues, that were marked by the British Library as "Add. Burney". It adds more than 100 new titles, including the *Public Hue and Cry*, and 130 expansions to titles in *Part I* of *Burney*.

CREATING A CONTENT SET

To begin, users build a corpus of documents that will provide the raw text data used to generate visualisations. Users can search across their library's *Gale Primary Sources* holdings and select documents to add to their custom content set. A side-by-side view of optical character recognition (OCR) text and the original scanned document image helps users quickly determine if the OCR text will help answer research questions through the analysis process.

ANALYSING CONTENT SETS

After creating a custom content set, users can analyse the data with the text-mining tools available in the Gale Lab. Once the tool runs completely, users can interrogate the visualisation and tabular data results to uncover patterns within their content set. Users can choose from six text-mining tools in the Gale Lab, including Ngrams, Named Entity Recognition, Topic Modelling, Parts of Speech, Sentiment Analysis and Clustering. Approachable descriptions of the tools and their results enable users new to text mining to make selections around how they would like to analyse their texts. Advanced researchers can customise tool configurations to generate new outputs.

MANAGING AND SHARING

Users review and manage their metadata, documents, analysis results and search history for use in or outside of the Gale Lab. They can also work iteratively with their content set to create versions of their analysis results. Users with advanced digital scholarship skills can export their content sets for use in third-party tools or those they have created.
