Your First Two Weeks with *Magnetic* Reading Foundations

Ensure a smooth launch of foundational skills instruction with Magnetic Reading Foundations by implementing these five practices:



Get to know your students!



Beginning-of-year assessments will help you understand your students' strengths and areas for growth. Use the i-Ready Diagnostic or other assessments to understand your students' foundational skills development.



Build relationships with your students. Notice their interests, how they approach books, the way they take feedback, etc. Knowing your students as both learners and people will help you be more effective as a teacher.

2 Adjust pacing for Week 1 of instruction.

We recommend spreading instruction for Week 1 across two weeks. This will allow you time to introduce new routines and procedures and help children build stamina for foundational skills work. Here is what this might look like:

Grade K

- Split Sessions 1–4 across two days.
 - On Day 1, teach Phonological Awareness and Phonics.
 - On Day 2, teach Letter Formation and Read Aloud! or Read Together!.
- Split the Weekly Assessment across two days. On Day 1, conduct the Whole-Class Assessment. On Day 2, conduct the Individual Assessment.
- Teach Alphabet Books instruction to the whole class until small group instruction is established.

Grades 1 and 2

- Split Sessions 2 and 4 across two days.
 - -On Day 1, teach Phonological Awareness and Phonics.
 - -On Day 2, teach the rest of the session.
- Because Sessions 1 and 3 are shorter in length than the other sessions in a week, do not split these sessions across two days.
- Split the Weekly Assessment across two days. On Day 1, conduct the Whole-Class Assessment. On Day 2, conduct the Individual Assessment.
- Teach Magnetic Readers instruction to the whole class until small group instruction is established.

3 Establish routines and procedures for small group instruction.

Small group instruction is an important component of Magnetic Reading Foundations! Children get to draw on all the skills you've explicitly taught as they experience reading with Alphabet Books and Magnetic Readers.

Take time to develop a schedule and teach procedures that will allow your students to work independently as you provide differentiated instruction in small groups.



- Magnetic Reading Foundations instruction is segmented into four parts across a week. Each part takes 10 to 15 minutes per rotation. Determine how you will incorporate instruction with Magnetic Readers for all of your small groups.
- Introduce independent or center activities that students will engage with while you provide small group instruction. Incorporate a lot of practice of these activities, gradually increasing students' stamina to stay focused on one activity for a 15-minute increment.
- 4 Build excitement for reading from Day 1!

Find ways to connect instruction with Magnetic Reading Foundations to other reading experiences in your classroom. Here are some of our favorite back-to-school read alouds you can find in your local library. Each has opportunities to point out the letters or sound-spelling patterns you'll teach in Week 1 and also connects topically to the texts from Week 1.

- Grade K: What I Like About Me written by Allia Zobel Nola and illustrated by Miki Sakamoto. Point out words that begin with the letters m and t, like me, music, twisty, or tall.
- Grade 1: Be Kind written by Pat Zietlow Miller and illustrated by Jen Hill. Point out words that have the short a sound, like ran, class, or back.
- Grade 2: The Word for Friend written and illustrated by Aidan Cassie. Point out words that have short vowel sounds, like shop, fluttery, mess, or puppets.
- Connect with families.
